Dear Parents, Carers and Friends of the Benalla P-12 College Community,

What an exciting day for all of us. Finally having all students back on-site after an extended period of remote learning is a great relief to all of us here at school and I am sure is also for parents and carers.

It was very pleasing to see the overwhelming majority of secondary students wearing full school uniform this morning - I saw several students in brand new school shoes. It makes such a difference and looks great when we have students in full uniform. Congratulations and thankyou to parents/carers and students for making the effort this morning to do this. I am sure that it will continue.

All secondary students were reminded of expected behaviours this morning and I know that primary students were last week as well. It may take some time for students to adjust to the school environment and expectations after such a long break, but I am confident they will be able to do so quickly. The sooner we can get back to safe and orderly classrooms where teachers are focussing on their teaching the better.

As mentioned last week, there is also a strong focus on transitions this term. Normally we would be running transition activities for students in Grade 4 moving to Clarke Street, but the current guidelines do not allow them to come on site. We will be producing a short video to show to students and parents that will introduce them to the Grade 5 teachers for next year and other key staff at Clarke Street. It will also provide an overview of the campus and the facilities and programs there. Watch out for this on our website and Facebook page.

Parents of students in the senior secondary years may have heard that there will be a process for ensuring students are not disadvantaged by remote learning this year. This process is called 'Consideration of Educational Disadvantage' and applies to all VCE students taking a Unit 3/4 subject. We received the information last week and will begin the process today by providing staff with the information they need. Parents will receive a more detailed explanation of the process tomorrow via Compass after students have a briefing at school. Studying Osteopathy at VU

Osteopaths diagnose, treat and provide preventative advice about disorders that affect the body's musculoskeletal system, using manual techniques to alleviate stresses and dysfunction to improve the body's function (<u>Good Universities Guide - Osteopath</u>)

VU offers one of only three of these accredited programs in Australia. Core studies include anatomy, osteopathic science, physiology, and biochemistry. Students undertake fieldwork and clinical practice to prepare them for their osteopathy career.

Students considering a career in osteopathy need to complete the **Bachelor of Science (Osteopathy)** first; this is a 3-year course and provides an entry into an osteopathy career. <u>Completion of the Bachelor of Science (Osteopathy)</u> course alone does not make graduates <u>eligible for registration as Osteopaths</u>. Students must also complete the Master of Health Science (Osteopathy) in order to be eligible to register as an Osteopath. So, the double degree program is:

<u>Bachelor of Science (Osteopathy)</u> – 3 years <u>Master of Health Science (Osteopathy)</u> – 1,5 years

On completion of both programs, students will be eligible for:

- registration with the Osteopaths Registration Board of Victoria
- registration as an Osteopath in all other Australian states
- membership with the Australian Osteopathic Association

VU has a an <u>Osteopathy Teaching Clinic</u> which usually operates over 40 weeks per year, and students are required to attend clinical sessions on a rotation basis including outside of semester hours to maintain a public service and provide continuity of patient care. Clinical training, including fieldwork, is crucial in the preparation to becoming an Osteopath.

Diploma of Teacher Education Preparation

The **Diploma of Teacher Education Preparation** may be the right study choice for students with the motivation, capability, and personal attributes to be a great teacher.

The *Diploma of Teacher Education Preparation (Dip TEP)* is an accredited AQF5 level qualification aimed at students who do not initially meet the minimum ATAR for teaching. The course has been developed as part of the Victorian Government's Excellence in Teacher Education Reforms to ensure that disadvantage and diverse educational experiences are not a barrier to capable and committed people who want to pursue a career in teaching.

Successful completion of the Dip TEP will ensure that students graduate with the prerequisite knowledge and skills to undertake an undergraduate teacher education course. The Dip TEP supports students to meet the literacy and numeracy standards they will need in order to graduate with a teaching qualification and supports them to meet the demands of study at a higher education level. The course introduces them to contemporary issues in education and to teaching as a profession, including practical school-based placement. **The course is offered by various institutions including** <u>ACU</u>, <u>RMIT</u>, <u>Swinburne</u>, and <u>VU Polytechnic</u>

Associate Degree in Engineering Technology

RMIT University offers the *Associate Degree in Engineering Technology* which is an excellent 2-year degree for students undecided which specialised area of Engineering they wish to study. This pathway course is also often used by students who do not attain the minimum English/EAL and Maths Methods study scores, or if their ATAR is not high enough to enter the bachelor's degree.

Students select their major in the second year of the course from the following:

- Civil
- Mechanical

- Advanced Manufacturing and Mechatronics

Teen Mental Health First Aid (TMHFA): What students need to know

Benalla P-12 College is conducting TMHFA training for the Year 8 cohort, which gives young people the skills they need to recognise and help with mental health problems and crises in their friends, and to get the help of an adult quickly.

This course isn't happening because of any specific problems at Benalla P-12 College.

Young people will often turn to each other when stressed or upset, and try to help each other, and sometimes take too much on. This course teaches you not to try to take on these problems alone, and when you should get an adult involved. You won't be talking about any problems you are having yourself and you won't learn to give therapy or diagnose a problem.

The course discusses different types of mental health crises, including suicidal thoughts. Some people may find it distressing. Talk to your parents about it if you're worried that talking about crisis situations will make it too hard for you to be a part of the course. However, you should be aware that most people find that even if they have lost someone to suicide, the information in the course makes them feel better, not worse.

Session 1 (October 14th) discusses mental health problems in general, and understanding how common and tough these are in young people.

Session 2 (October 22nd) talks about helping a friend who is in crisis, whether because they are suicidal, engaging in nonsuicidal self-injury, or experiencing bullying or abuse.

The Action Plan ('Look, Ask, Listen, Help Your Friend') is introduced for the first time, and there is a video demonstrating how someone could offer support to a friend.

Session 3 (October 30th) In this session you will practice using the ACTION PLAN so you feel prepared to help a friend in need. We won't teach you how to diagnose problems – it's advice about being a supportive friend, encouraging your friend to seek help, and knowing when it's time to get someone else involved.

You will take your manual home after session 3. There are resources for further information in the back and you may want to explore them alone or with your parents. If you wish to learn more now, resources are also provided overleaf. **If you wish to learn more...**
