

I felt proud and responsible, showing my grandparents around the school!



UNIVERSITY BUS TOURS-NORTH & SOUTH

In the past month, our senior students have had the chance to visit university campuses in Albury and also in Melbourne.

In mid-May students travelled to Wangaratta to visit the Regional Study Centre, which is used by both Charles Sturt University and GOTAFE. Students toured the facility and saw in particularly where Animals Studies and Vet Nursing take place, getting the chance to interact with rabbits and chickens as well seeing the grooming and vet hospital areas. Students then travelled to Albury where they visited La Trobe, seeing classrooms, lecture theatres and accommodation. Charles Sturt University was the final stop for the day, where in wet and soggy conditions students visited a number of accommodation options, classrooms, labs and lecture theatres. Students learnt about the various courses at each location and about the VTAC application process.

An early start to the day saw students travel south bound to Melbourne. One bus visiting RMIT and La Trobe and the other bus taking students to Deakin and the University of Melbourne. Student ambassadors took students on tours of the large campuses, showing them various areas of study as well as accommodation and recreational facilities.

Many thanks to Tomorrow Today for arranging both trips for students in Benalla. It was great to spend the day with students and staff from FCJ finding out about tertiary study options in our region and beyond.

Federal

The word **federal** is an adjective that describes the central or national level of government and the laws associated with this level.

Federal laws are laws that apply to all states, cities, and suburbs of a country. E.g., *The federal law of Australia says that voting is compulsory for all Australian citizens from the age of 18.*

Other types of laws, such as state laws, can vary from state to state. For example, in Victoria, you must be 18 years old to have the right to drive, but in NSW you can apply for a driving licence from the age of 17.

Federal laws are central to a country. Therefore, they are the same in every state and city of that country.

Perceive

To perceive is a verb. It means to see and to understand things or people in a certain way because of the opinions, feelings and experiences that we already have. Therefore, *to perceive* is the action of understanding and remembering information about something or someone in a way of our own.

To perceive is to understand and to interpret with attitude and feelings because of our prior personal experiences and existing perspectives

E.g., I did not perceive her as an aggressive person until that day. She always seemed so gentle.
